

The Philatelic Society of South Australia has the distinction of being the oldest continuously operating philatelic society in Australia and, we believe, one of the 10 oldest in the world. The Society was founded in 1888, by a small band of enthusiastic stamp collectors who responded to an advertisement in *The South Australian Advertiser* on 29 October 1888, which read as follows: -


"To Stamp Collectors. Persons desirous of forming a Philatelic Society in Adelaide are requested to meet in Mr. Krichauff's Office, Flinders Street, on Monday evening, October 29th, at 8 o'clock."



Sixteen people attended the meeting and of these, fifteen handed in their names. They, with two others who applied by letter, were enrolled as foundation members. Mr. F. C. Krichauff was elected first President of the Society and Mr. O. W. Rosenhain, Secretary. In 2023, the Society elected their first female President, Jennifer Mibus.

In the early years the Society struggled with a small membership, but gradually the membership grew, and the Society flourished. Today, membership is still strong, however, fewer members attend meetings. To accommodate members preferences, this year we are trialing the fourth Saturday of the month at 1.30pm.

In 1936, the membership was heavily involved in the organization of the South Australian Centenary, Australasian Philatelic Exhibition, including the publication of the official catalogue.



The Society has had a major involvement in every exhibition held in South Australia since then and continues to support philatelic events in South Australia.

Over the years, an extensive library of reference material has been accumulated by the Society, which is continuously being updated. SAPHIL House holds the Society's library of catalogues, handbooks, monographs, and journals for the use of members. The library is available to members at all meetings. The library catalogue can be downloaded from our club page on the SAPC website.





The Philatelic Society of South Australia is holding an annual Open Day at SAPHIL House. The Open Day features a display of the Society's extensive collection of historical philatelic material. Local stamp dealers also have tables of material for sale. A part of South Australia's History Festival Month, the 2024 Open Day is on Sunday, 19th May. We hope to see you there!



Three times a year the Society publishes its journal *Stamp Talk*. The journal contains articles on member's research projects, other articles of interest, and meeting reports including details of member's presentations and displays. The Society's journal is included in membership subscription.

At each meeting there is a display of philatelic material is provided by members, visitors, or from our large archive of material. Circuit books are available at each meeting. A small auction is also held at most meetings.



Members of the Society have access to specialist equipment at each meeting. Recently, a generous member donated a SAFE Perfotronic Electronic Stamp Perforation Gauges as well as a Signoscope. We also have a UV light available at all meetings.



SAFE Perfotronic: Measures the perforation value within a fraction of a second with the help of light sensors. The processor is even able to extrapolate the number of teeth on stamps with missing or broken teeth. Nothing touches your stamp, therefore no damage possible. Accurate to 1/1000 mm Displays in 1/4 increments, i.e. 14.25,14.5, 14.75, 15, etc.

SAFE Signoscope: Watermark detector. It's simple and works quickly. Just place your stamp into the Signoscope. If there is a watermark, it will show, even on yellow or orange stamps. You don't need to have any special skills or training to see the watermarks.

Bert Wajer 1934-2024

It is with deep regret that the Philatelic Society of South Australia records the passing of Bert Wajer on 8 February 2024. He was one of the founding members of the former Aus-

tralian Commonwealth Group of the Philatelic Society of South Australia and a major contributor to the Group's journal StampTalk over many years.

His main area of research has been in the King George V Head issues in all denominations and he has researched and plated the 4 pence halfpenny and 1 shilling and 4 pence values and privately published monographs. Other work has involved research on the 1d Die 3 and again he privately published his research, and also his coresearch on the 2d Die 1. In conjunction with Mr. M. Hill of Melbourne, Bert researched the ½d value. Further to this work, Bert has also researched and plated the 4 pence halfpenny surcharge value.

His work, jointly with Gordon Monk and the late Paul Kaigg on the King George V One Penny Red stamp, in particular the Die II issue is continuing. He was also acknowledged in the 1988 edition of the Australian Commonwealth Specialists Catalogue for his work on the new format and extensive revisions to the King George V Head issues.

His research and tireless effort over many years and his willingness to share the wealth of knowledge and research was recognized with him being awarded the Australian Philatelic Order Research Medal. He also received the Briskham Award in 1988 for his services to philately in South Australia and Australia.

Originally living in suburban Adelaide he regularly attended meetings of the Commonwealth

Group, but later moving to rural areas of the state his attendance at meetings was far less regular and thus he was probably not as well known to many members, although in the last few years after he moved back to the suburbs he became more regular at meetings.

Sadly, due to ill health in the last eighteen months he was unable to attend meetings as he would have preferred.

Pat Cooper 1930-2024

The South Australian Philatelic Community has lost one of its quiet, hard-working volunteers—Pat Cooper—who passed away on February 26 after a short but intense illness.

Pat was New Zealand-born, but came to know many parts of Australia. She first lived in Sydney when her late husband Eric was stationed at Garden Island for the Australian Navy, then in Canberra for nearly 20 years. They bought a newsagency/deli in Hobart and later lived in Devonport and then Launceston, where Eric died 25 years ago.

Pat moved to South Australia, where she had siblings, about 10 years ago, but usually spent part of the summer back in Tasmania with her family. Pat was a great lover of quite diverse sports. She was an accomplished left-handed tennis player in Tasmania and later volunteered at cycling events all around Australia, including the Commonwealth Games.

Once in Adelaide, Pat joined Salisbury Philatelic Society (April 2017), Eastern Districts, and the Printed Collectables Club. Her collecting interests were broad but modest – she said simply



In intricate detail of mid-18th century topography and customs of Suzhou allows modern viewers to visit a Chinese city. Artist Xu Yang wrote that he paint-

ed it in order to depict a peaceful and prosperous reign, and to pay homage to the reign of the Qianlong Emperor.



The artwork vividly illustrates the visual appearance of the terrain, urban landscapes, and everyday life in an area covering several dozen miles. The middle of the scroll depicts an idealised view of all the activities of the bustling urban centre of Suzhou.

Viewers can see numerous merchants, traders, barges and passenger boats, as well as dense rows of shops and vendors. More than 4,800 human figures, 2,000 architectural structures, and 400 boats are present. The Scroll was thoroughly enjoyed by all.

To commemorate 100 years since the regular Cobb & Co service ceased, a replica Cobb & Co coach embarked on a 4-day trip from Mil Lel to Penola in the lower South East of SA. Starting on the 8th April 2024 and driven by owner Rob Fairchild, the coach will be stopping at the local primary schools along the way. With several sponsors including the Mt Gambier Philatelic Society, Rob will be handing out, free of charge, 450 postcards complete with stamp to the schools.

It wasn't just a step back in time from the transport perspective, rather it gave insight into historical postal trends. The Mount Gambier Philatelic Society produced postcards, stamps, and hand cancels to commemorate the event. Children penned a few words on their cards, which were posted back to them from Penola once the coach completed its trips.



"Many of the kids would never have even received a letter or postcard in the mail and many would never have written a letter so it was fun," Rob said. Blank cards are \$2.00 each, cancelled cards \$10.00 with tracking postage of \$5.00. 

Gordon Oates wrote an article that was published in *Australian Stamps Professional*, Mar/ Apr 2024, page 35-37.

As a member of the Australian Railway Historical Society (S A Branch), being transferred to Leigh Creek in 1969 gave me an opportunity to research the history of the old Alice Springs rail line, then still in use as far north as Marree principally to transport coal from Leigh Creek to Port Augusta. On one of my local forays I stumbled across the ghost town of Farina. I learnt a bit of the history of the town, including that prior to World War II Farina had been the first stopping place for the airline route from Adelaide to Alice Springs, the other stopping place being Oodnadatta. Aviation navigation aids were virtually non-existent then and pilots used the railway line as their "iron compass".

I joined the Civil Aviation Historical Society of South Australia and from its resources I found out more about the Guinea Airlines operations between Adelaide, or Parafield as the main airport was then, and Alice Springs. While working at Parafield between 1966 and 1969 as a Pilot Briefing Officer, I met Captain Noble "Nobby" Buckley and heard stories about what it had been like as an airline pilot. Later, at an auction I acquired a cover flown from Farina to Adelaide. Further research in the CAHSSA archives lead to details of the flight on that particular day, including the aircraft call sign and pilot – Nobby Buckley, and further research into the archives completed the story. I present the story to you.

This is the brief history behind an airmail cover – town of origin, the company that flew the mail, the aircraft and the destination addressee. It provides a fascinating insight into life in outback Australia in the last two centuries.

The Township of Farina

Farina was located on the Great Northern Railway from Port Augusta to Alice Springs. It served as a watering point for the railway and a supply point for the sheep and cattle stations in the area. Originally named Farina in the hope of growing crops, the annual rainfall proved insufficient. At its peak it boasted a population of about 600 with a bakery, grain store, two breweries, two hotels, general store, post office, Anglican Church, cemetery, five blacksmiths, a school and a brothel. The realignment of the Alice Springs railway line in the 1980's resulted in he abandonment of the town but it is now being restored by a small group of enthusiastic caravanners.



The Overland Route Adelaide to Darwin

The first survey of a route from Adelaide to Alice Springs was completed by John McDouall Stuart on his sixth attempt in 1861 - 1862. Ten years later fierce competition between South Australia and Queensland resulted in the construction of the Overland Telegraph route, following Stuart's route through the centre of Australia and terminating at Port Darwin, where the undersea cable from Java had been terminated. This cable officially opened on Thursday 22 August 1872 and now the southern states were directly connected to Great Britain. In 1871 a second cable connected Perth to Java and finally in 1877 a cable across the Nullarbor Plain connected Perth to Adelaide.

The Coming of the Railway to Farina

As early as the 1860's, mineral discoveries in the Flinders Ranges prompted the authorities to consider the merits of building a railway north from Port Augusta. The initial plan was to build a line 200 miles (330 km) into the interior. Several routes were considered but eventually it was decided to construct a railway through Pichi Richi Pass, across the Willochra Plain to Wonoka (present-day Hawker), through Puttapa to the plain on the western side of the Flinders Ranges then generally northward. The line was declared open at a ceremony in Quorn by the State Governor of the day, Sir William Jervois, on 22 May 1882. Henceforth Government Gums was known as Farina: Latin for flour, as the tablelands to the east were intended to be the northernmost agricultural area. Initially Farina was the intended terminus but by the time construction of the line was under way, most people realised that there would be no wheat to carry from Farina.

Even before the railway had been opened to Farina, the nature of the traffic it would carry changed from wheat and minerals to cattle, sheep, and wool. In 1882 - 1883 nearly 15,250 bales of wool were transported to southern markets - notably Adelaide compared with 13,880 in 1881 - 1882. For two years Farina was the railhead for the Oodnadatta, Birdsville and Strzelecki Tracks. But an extension of the line beyond Farina to Marree (then known as Hergott Springs) was logical to tap into livestock travelling from pastoral leases west of Lake Eyre and down the Birdsville Track from the north-east. The extension beyond Farina to Hergott Springs was officially opened on 7 January 1884.

The line passed to Commonwealth ownership on 1 January 1911, but continued to be operated by the South Australian Railways until the Commonwealth Railways took over operations on 1 January 1926. The Commonwealth Government also undertook the extension of the railway to Alice Springs, and this was completed in 1929.

In the years following World War Two large tonnages of coal were railed from Leigh Creek and heavy demands were placed on the railway. In many ways the original line was inadequate; sharp curves and heavy gradients limited train loads, whilst light track and bridges restricted speeds and axle loads. Consequently, a new railway of 4 ft. 81/2 in. gauge was constructed to avoid the heavier graded terrain, and extended from Stirling North via Telford (Leigh Creek) to Marree, opening on 27 July 1957 to Marree. The Old Ghan and the Budd diesel rail car provided passenger services between Marree and Port Pirie until the new line from Tarcoola to Alice Springs opened in 1980.

With the closure of the Port Augusta Power Station and Leigh Creek Coalfields, the rail line from Port Augusta to Leigh Creek closed in 2016.

Air Route Adelaide to Darwin

Farina was the first stop out of Parafield Airport, Adelaide, on the Darwin air route. It was served by Guinea Airways, a company formed originally in New Guinea to service the gold mines and later expanded to Australia to operate the Adelaide - Darwin route. After World War Two the Federal Government forced the company to hand over the Adelaide - Darwin route to TAA, leaving the company with only local South Australian services. It eventually became Airlines of South Australia which was taken over by Ansett Airways until that company's demise. With the outbreak of World War Two, air traffic on the route increased considerably and a shorter route from Adelaide to Oodnadatta via Mt. Eba station was implemented.

Guinea Airways Services to Farina

Flights between Adelaide and Darwin operated three times a week in each direction with an overnight stop in Alice Springs. The aircraft used were the Lockheed Model 10a from the Lockheed factory at Burbank, California, shipped as deck cargo from Los Angeles to Port Adelaide.

VH-UXI Service History

The particular aircraft used to carry this cover was VH-UXI "Moresby" which arrived at Port Adelaide on the S.S. "Mirrabooka" in June 1937. It was towed on its undercarriage minus the outer wings and tail from Port Adelaide to Parafield via Grand Junction Road and Main North Road. A test flight was flown on 12th August and a certificate of airworthiness issued on the same day. Four days later it entered service on the Adelaide – Darwin route.

Departure Point – Farina Airport

Only basic facilities existed at Farina, with refuelling by hand pump from 44 gallon drums on a handcart.

Destination – Parafield

Parafield was the main airport at Adelaide from 1st October 1927 to 11th February 1955, when the new airport at West Beach became Adelaide's principal airport with Parafield as a secondary airport for light aircraft.

The Short Life of VH-UXI

The aircraft only had a short service history. On 18th December 1937 the aircraft departed Darwin for Adelaide at 05.35. Twenty miles out of Darwin, the starboard engine failed and the pilot turned the aircraft back to Darwin. With the engine still on fire and unable to maintain height, the aircraft was force landed in the dark in trees adjacent to the railway line about a mile south of Darwin. Captain Noble "Nobby" Buckley and First Officer U.G. Edgerton evacuated the ten Army passengers and their baggage before the aircraft was destroyed by fire. The aircraft was struck off the register on the same day. By a curious coincidence I met Nobby Buckley when I was a Pilot Briefing Officer at Parafield Airport in the late 1960's, just before he gave up flying.



Colton, Palmer & Preston, Adelaide

Colton, Palmer and Preston were ironmongers and hardware merchants in Adelaide. Founded by John Colton in 1842 as a hardware and saddler company, the company amalgamated with Harold Brothers in 1889 and expanded their business to become ironmongers, hardware merchants, and manufacturers of saddlery, harness, tarpaulins, canvas blinds, makers of cabin and travelling bags, suit cases, etc, from premises in Currie Street, Adelaide, with branches in Port Adelaide, Port Pirie, Broken Hill, and London.

The Museum of Philately becomes a Non-Profit Organisation and appoints Simon Martin-Redman as its new President.




